The site team at Galliford Try would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone in the local community for their support and patience during the delivery of the new roundabout and associated infrastructure.



Over the coming months the new pedestrian and equestrian crossing will be completed, after the power connection is made by Electricity North West. This work will not require any traffic management so there will be no impact on residents.

The delivery of projects such as this is much more that just the kerbs and tarmac that people see as the finished product. A project is about the local community, training, the environment, team spirit and quality.







This scheme has delivered big environmental improvements in such a small area. 40 trees were planted on the completion of this work. The scheme also created biodiversity enhancements by creating invertebrate habitats within the embankments (stone strips) and also a hibernacula (buried rubble and wood). These areas provide both natural shelter and a source of food for a variety of wildlife in the area.

During the spring months our team will be back on site to sow a mixture of grass and wildflower seed to the open public areas.

Buxton Junior School Visit

The project team delivered a hugely enjoyable tetrahedron (a triangular based pyramid) activity to the pupils of Buxton Junior School. This activity encourages young children into Science Technology Engineering and Mathematic (STEM) subjects and teaches them more about the opportunities available to them through STEM.





Cunningdale Allotments

This project assisted with the expansion of the Cunningdale allotments by clearing two areas of overgrowth and rubble. One area has been left for future use for new plots and the other area has been transformed into a new parking and unloading area.
